The Montana Council was formed in 1973 as the result of a merger of four councils: Western Montana, Yellowstone Valley, North Central Montana and Vigilante Council. Our mission is to help young people make ethical and moral decisions over their lifetimes by instilling in them the values of the Scout Oath and Scout Law.

Since its inception, the Montana Council has graduated more than 3,000 Eagle Scouts, the highest rank a young person can achieve in Scouting. For this packet, we've asked our list of Montana Eagle Scouts to reflect on their time in Scouting and how it has affected the course of their lives.

Outdoor Exploration

Montana is a special place. The Montana Council recognizes just how fortunate we are to be located in Big Sky Country. Mountains, rivers, wildlife and endless recreation opportunities can literally be found out our back door. And even with unmatched access to wilderness activities, life gets busy. We find ourselves inside a big box store on a Saturday afternoon, towing the kids around town to cross routine items off a never-ending to-do list.

When you involve your child in Scouting, they get out of the car, off the screen and into nature. And when that happens, the results can be pretty remarkable.

Kids benefit from a natural, diverse environment. According to the National Wildlife Federation, children who spend at least an hour a day playing freely outside experience increased attention spans, better performance in school, higher levels of fitness and improved moods. In what positive ways did your experience in Scouts BSA impact your career?

I endeavor daily to put forth the best version of myself to benefit the people and livestock in my care and to complete tasks and projects in a manner consistent with the twelve points of the Scout Law, and find no trouble applying them practically.

In what positive ways did your experience in Scouts BSA impact your life?

Leadership and practical life skills learned in Scouting are irreplaceable in a society like ours which depends upon diverse and unique individuals forming groups with the aim of collective success. Although it was not and is not always readily apparent, everything I do in life can be connected in parallel to an experience or teachable moment I had as a Scout.

If you were talking to a room full of parents undecided if Scouts BSA is right for their kids, what would you say?

Scouting gives young people a framework to grow and build upon for the rest of their lives. Scouting provides structure in a safe, dependable environment and exposes young people to values, ethics, skills and ideas that they may have otherwise missed but will undoubtedly never expire.

What would you say to a young man or woman considering leaving Scouts because life is getting too busy?

My answer to this is simple. If you enjoy Scouting, and all that is holding you back from achieving Eagle is life becoming too busy, you will regret forever not completing the journey to Eagle. Many opportunities were given to me because of my ability to work with others no matter what age, race or faith.

This was especially prevalent in my opportunity to attend the 12th National Scout Jamboree. Many times I have come across a situation where I am able to open the

eyes of another individual simply due to the experiences I had as a Scout — whether it was hiking 50 miles on a forest trail, swimming a mile in glacial water or just planning the next month’s Scout meetings. Knowing that I took the Scout Oath and lived by the Scout Law provided and continues to provide a “center of strength” for guidance.

If you were talking to a room full of parents undecided if Scouts BSA is right for their kids, what would you say to them?

Scouts is not for everyone, but Scouts is available for everyone who has a desire to learn. If your son or daughter joins Scouts, it will provide

them with many, many moments that will enrich their lives. They will experience the outdoors and learn first-hand why being prepared is the Scout Motto. When they or one of their fellow Scouts forgets an extra pair of socks or batteries for their flashlight, it will create a lasting impression so they will not only be prepared for their own encampment, but understand the importance of communicating to ensure the safest experience.

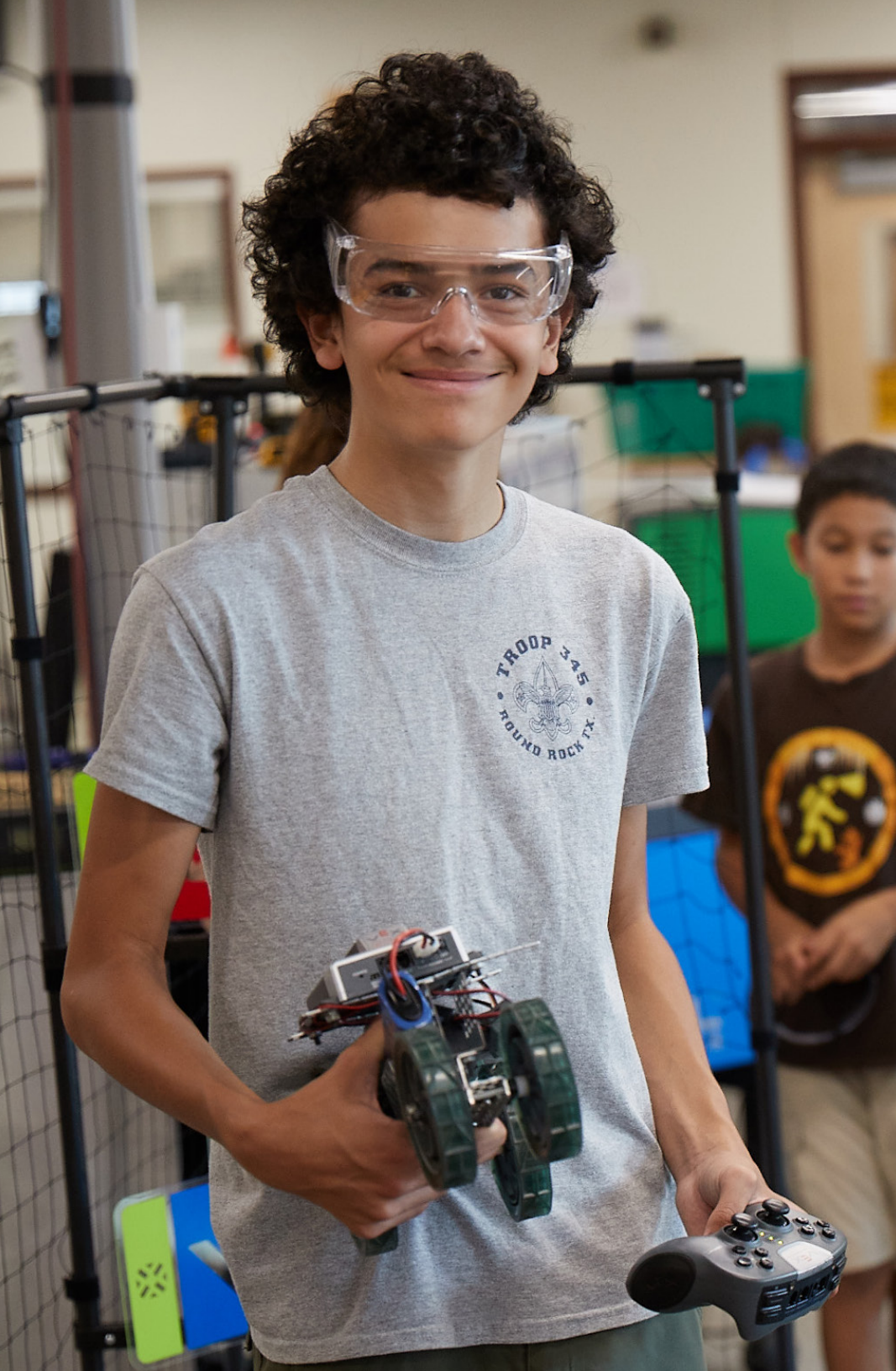

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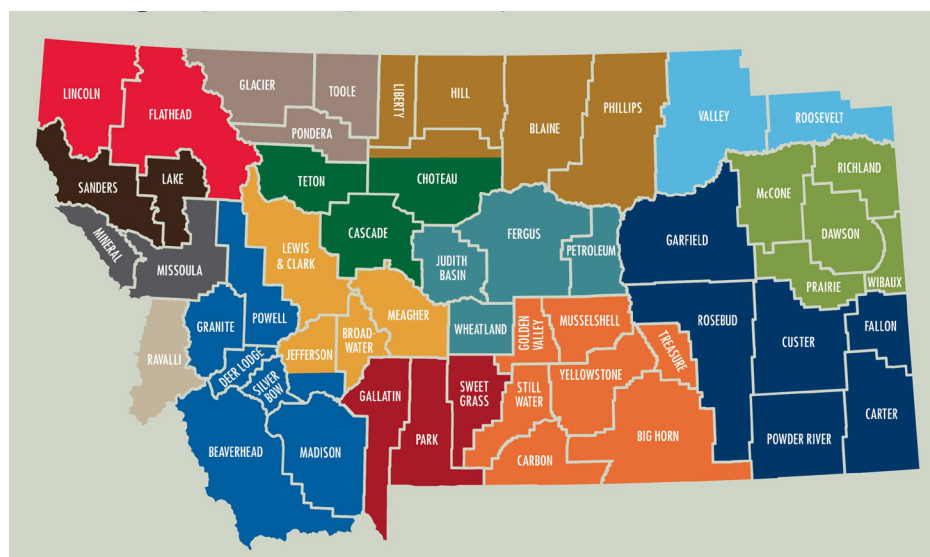
